Originality and creativity
Varied sentence structure
Writing in detail and with flair
Writing in the correct tone
Adapting authorial voice to the given purpose
 Clear and innovative structure, organising ideas by paragraphs which are demonstrated by leaving a line
Well-selected vocabulary
Use of figurative language
Sound grammar, spelling, punctuation and presentation

Questions will be answered about a passage of Latin Pupils are advised to answer questions by translating words from the Latin text. Vocabulary knowledge is key.

Translation

Approx. 8-10 lines.

This is marked per word. There are 2 marks per verb (tense and meaning). All other words are 1 mark. Pupils must also translate with the correct syntax to gain full marks.

The translation is marked out of around 60-70 which is then divided down to a mark out of 30

Technical / Grammar Terminology

This includes the English to Latin section: two short sentences worth 8-10 marks. There is one mark for correct basic Latin word order (subject – object – verb).

Grammar Terminology: this includes questions on grammar, eg. What part of speech is et = answer: conjunction. This will be a multiple-choice section.
